

Settled over 2,000 years ago, the moku of Wai'anae is one of the first areas on O'ahu inhabited by Hawaiians in wa kahiko (traditional times). Well-suited for both wet and dry land agriculture, Wai'anae was O'ahu's "breadbasket," with perennial streams irrigating fertile crop lands and contributing to Wai'anae's abundant ocean fishing grounds.

The Wai'anae "breadbasket" is still there with many small farms working to produce food for Hawai'i nei.

Come join the effort to protect and restore the farming traditions of Wai'anae for the benefit of everyone in Hawai'i.

Stops include: Kaʻolae in Lualualei Valley, the Waiʻanae Farmers' Market, and MAʻO Farms.
